School Librarians are LITERACY ADVOCATES

- Inspire the next generation of readers by connecting the right book with the right student, thus increasing literacy attainment
- Teach media and digital literacy skills so students can better analyze the modern world - important skills for the future
- Collaborate and co-teach with other faculty, expanding literacy in all content areas
- Organize reading incentives and author visits, encouraging recreational reading

School Librarians are RESOURCE CURATORS

- Purchase and maintain collection materials while staying current with new technologies
- Create usable and welcoming library spaces that promote access for everyone often in multiple languages
- Ensure budget dollars are spent wisely, enabling resource sharing for all students and staff
- Identify and compile resources for teachers to support, reinforce, and extend classroom learning

School Librarians are RESEARCH & INFORMATION SPECIALISTS

- Teach students how to ethically gather, review, share, and cite information
- Facilitate new digital resources for staff and students, ensuring that users know how to connect and access what they need
- Encourage student inquiry and curiosity through exploration of online databases, primary sources, and engineering makerspaces
- Collaborate with administration to develop policies around intellectual honesty, artificial intelligence use, and copyright
